New programs and program revisions laid the foundation for a very eventful year at the Sanford-Brown College - Fenton campus.

In 2007, we started a veterinary technology program after receiving a five-year provisional accreditation from the American Veterinary Medical Association. The accreditation will provide our future graduates with the opportunity to take the Veterinary Technician National Examination. Our first Vet Tech class graduated in October 2007!

We also received approval for a new associate degree program in diagnostic medical sonography - with a focus on general ultrasound. To support this new program, we purchased four new ultrasound machines for the lab and we will purchase an additional three machines in 2008, giving the students industry-current equipment with which to learn the skills necessary for this demanding occupation. Our first class started in January 2008.

Another exciting program revision occurred with our respiratory therapy program. Program graduates are now immediately eligible to take the Certified Respiratory Therapist (CRT) and Registered Respiratory Therapist (RRT) exams*. Prior to this program revision, our graduates were only eligible to take the exam for the CRT.

I hope that this New Year finds you healthy and happy!

Here are some of the exciting developments taking place on our campuses.

Collinsville

Imagine, as a recent business school graduate, being able to tell a prospective employer that you have hands-on experience running your own company. Students who enroll in the new Associate of Applied Science in Business Administration degree program at the Collinsville campus will have the opportunity to do just that. The first class starts in March 2008.

The new program offers a capstone simulation course to students in the last quarter of their curriculum. "It incorporates every facet of business," says Joy, "including accounting, marketing, project management, financial, production, human resources and information management." Students work together in teams based on their different strengths and are given the mission to start and run their own company. The teams create a product, develop it, market it, sell it and maintain financial "year-end" reports – the simulation course is divided into eight rounds, with each round representing one year. At the end of the course, the instructor determines the winning team by analyzing the team's financial reports.

The program, in which students can obtain a specialized associate degree in Business Administration with a concentration in accounting or business management, is designed to "make sure students have a thorough understanding of how business works," says Joy Sanford, department chair. "I believe that students will benefit from this course," added Joy, "and it will give them a competitive edge."

Fenton

In the past year, the Business Administration Specialized Associate Degree Program at Sanford-Brown College, Fenton campus was changed from a 101 credit hours to 90 credit hours program "to dovetail with the bachelor's program," said Bill Cook, department chair. Previously, students lost credits if they went from an associate to bachelor's program. "Now it is seamless and no credits are lost."

This was an important change because many students in the specialized associate program do go on to get their bachelor's degree – some immediately. Others come back after taking a break to recharge their batteries.

Business administration is one of the two largest programs at the Fenton campus, where students can get an Associate of Applied Science degree in Business Administration with a concentration in accounting, or in business management – with which they can pursue management training, entry-level bookkeeping and accounting positions.

While students range in age from their teens to well into their 60s, the average student is female in her 20's with some business experience. "Just about all of them work, go to school, and have a family," said Bill. "Time is crucial. And time with family is important. They can get through the specialized associate program in seven quarters."

Bill calls himself a cheerleader for the business administration program because "it's one of the most versatile programs." Business graduates can pursue careers in any business, government, non-profit – and a lot of students want to start their own business. In these times, people don't stay with one company for

their entire career. The more education and skills you have, the more versatile you are, and the better it is for you and your family."

Hazelwood

The dental assistant program is back at the Sanford-Brown Hazelwood campus! "The program has been revamped and realigned to give students more flexibility," says Marjorie Stoeker, department chair, "We had our first start in August."

The 40-week program is designed to prepare students for the Registered Dental Assistant (RDA) exam; and includes two 150-hour externships – working in two private practices. Marjorie tells students, "Whether you get hired from an externship really depends on how you do. If the company has an opening, you're right there. Everyone should consider it a five-week interview."

Support Doesn't Stop After Graduation

Picture yourself standing in the parking lot of a potential employer with a case of the jitters – minutes before a job interview. What do you do?

If you're like a lot of Sanford-Brown College students and graduates, you might just call the schools' career services office for a pre-interview pep talk. Collinsville's Kim Thebeau says that happens often, "when it does, we go over their concerns and help them feel more comfortable."

That's just one example of how the staff at the SBC campuses help their students and graduates succeed. "We're here for all aspects of their career and professional development," says Hazelwood's Bryan Tippy. He tells new students and potential enrollees that if they are serious about

impressing employers, "career services can help get you there."

The SBC Career Services teams offer a variety of support. "We work with both students and graduates," says Fenton's Paula Rhodes-Wilson. "While students are in school they may want to get started on their resume and find a part-time job. As graduation nears, students want to make sure their resume impresses and catches the attention of potential employers."

In addition, a stand-out cover letter, good references and the all-important interview skills can help them stand out in a crowd," she adds.

Career services helps students and graduates improve their resume – but won't write them

as it is important that students know what goes into a great resume. "We also encourage them to step away from using templates," says Paula. "Many employers don't like these guides and can identify when one is being used. We help students polish their resume, interview skills, and appearance."

"Our goal is to teach our graduates to fish, not give them the fish," says Bryan. "Give them the skills, tools, resources and set them up so, in the future, they can do it on their own."

Sanford-Brown also hosts job fairs on campus. "We invite employers that can best meet the needs and requirements of our students and graduates," says St. Peter's Bonnie Rohe. Employers look at these visits as opportunities to promote their companies and begin their initial search for new employees. In addition, each school posts a "Hot Jobs" list on campus and on the student portal site; and fields calls from employers inquiring about top candidates.

After graduation, the team follows up weekly with students still searching for employment – to help them stay on track. Graduates and students are welcome to use the resources of the career service center, including job books and computer stations at any time.

Perhaps one of the most valuable services the team offers is interview skills training. By using a variety of techniques, including "mock interviews" students and graduates perfect their presentations over time. "No one likes to interview," says Kim, "and everyone gets nervous. We coach and encourage them."

It only makes sense to take advantage of all the services available to Sanford-Brown students and graduates. According to Bryan Tippy, "We are your resource – before and after graduation." ■

David Hunter

Medical Assistant Instructor, SBC

Collinsville Graduate –
Medical Assistant Program



Even as a student in the medical assistant program, David Hunter thought he'd like to be an instructor at Sanford-Brown College some day. "Because it looked really easy," he states. As an instructor, he laughs, "The truth is – the instructors make it look easy, but it's a lot harder than I thought."

The road to the Sanford-Brown classroom began before graduation – first with an externship at Tri-Lab (where he worked as a phlebotomist) and then at St. Louis Connect, a clinic for patients with sexually-transmitted diseases. He says a friend helped him get the interview, but there were no openings. The interviewer did encourage David to call back on a weekly basis, however.

"So I called back every week, just like she told me to." After about a month, David was offered a job as an urgent care medical assistant. It was while he worked at the clinic, that David decided to pursue his dream to teach. First, he assisted in the classroom one night a week; and later moved to a position as an adjunct instructor. Today, he is a full-time faculty member.

David says when he was a student, his instructors would "push you to learn – in a good and positive way. Now, I'm the same way in class." And how does he like teaching? "It gets better every quarter. I absolutely love it!"

Fenton Graduate –
Medical Assistant Program



Tonya Warfel was the first person in her family to go to college. So when she graduated from the medical assistant program at Fenton, her family was there to help celebrate this accomplishment. "It was a big deal to me," she exclaimed.

Everyone in her family encouraged her to go into the healthcare field. "I guess because of the way I took care of my grandfather when he came to stay with us after a fall."

Her goal after graduation was to get hired from the Baker Medical Center where she held her externship. "I completed my externship on Friday and started working the following Monday." Her advice to current students is, "Take it [your externship] very seriously. Work extra hard – show them that you want the job."

As a mother of three who was going through a divorce when she started college, Tonya was able to get the maximum financial aid to help pay for her education. However, she still needed income and found it necessary to get a job. So, Tonya switched from day to evening classes in order to support her family and continue in school.

She praises her instructor Bobby Wayman for keeping her motivated. "I'd come to class after working all day and I'd be exhausted. She kept me interested. She always stressed the importance of taking it seriously – that it wasn't a game."

"I had a really good experience at Sanford-Brown College, It's a lot different when you're actually working. Looking back, there's a lot I already knew when I started working that I wouldn't if I hadn't gone to school."

LaKesha House always wanted to be a nurse, but she didn't know how to go about it. Instead, after high school she went to work for an airline catering company. When that job ended after seven years,

she decided to pursue her dream and a degree in the healthcare field. In July 2007, LaKesha received her Medical Assistant - Associate of Applied Science degree from Sanford-Brown College - Hazelwood.

Today, she works for an otolaryngology practice at SLU Care®, a health services division of St. Louis University and for a dermatologist with his own practice.

LaKesha credits Yolanda Shackelford, Vincent Lams and Bryan Tippy in the Career Services Department with her success. "I wasn't getting anywhere on my own. Once they got involved, I got the jobs."

"They helped me put my resume together and reviewed interview questions with me. So, when I got to the interview I wasn't so nervous", says LaKesha. Remembering her instructors at Sanford-Brown, "All my teachers, especially Mr. Gonzales, were both uplifting and encouraging".

LaKesha sees a future in nursing, but really enjoys medical assisting. Once she is ready to start nursing school, her employer, St. Louis University, will help pay for part of her tuition – a nice perk for this mother of three girls.

LaKesha offers some simple advice for current students, "Put yourself out there. Don't be afraid to ask questions. Do your best and believe in yourself."

Due to the increasing interest in holistic and alternative medicine, and an aging population, massage therapy has a projected growth rate of 20% during the same period**. Many massage therapists run their own businesses and work with chiropractors, physicians, spas and sports facilities. We are continuing to experience growth with our other programs.

The student dental labs have been renovated as well. According to Marjorie, the facility looks like a dentist's office. In addition to a sterilization area, a lab where students can pour out impressions, students can practice procedures in four operatories.

As students progress through the program, they can learn about patient care, infection control and sterilization in pre-clinic and then move on to chair-side assisting where they practice on fellow students and typodonts (plastic models of teeth). Students are also introduced to dental specialties such as endodontics, periodontics, orthodontics and oral surgery. In addition to classroom studies, students participate in community health fairs offering children 'tooth prints', otherwise known as dental identification.

"Being a dental assistant is like being the dentist's extra set of hands," says Marjorie. "It's not monotonous. Every day is different."

St. Peters

In January, the St. Peters campus started the first class for the new Bachelor of Science in Nursing (B.S.N.) program. "We are very excited," said Julia Leeman, college president. "This is an opportunity for our current and future students to advance their education, and for our nursing alumni to take their careers to the next step." The typical student is a registered nurse with a strong interest in progressing bedside skills, leadership development and an applied research role.

The 60-week program was built around a holistic model of care with focused areas in clinical practice, research, education and

administration/management. It blends campus and online learning.

"The online portion of the B.S.N. is fairly unique," said Michelle Hopper, nursing program chair. "Our students can expect to integrate critical thinking and apply knowledge by using case scenarios, simulation, journal entries, researching periodicals and the internet, and peer-assessment."

The program adopts the principles of St. Peters' faculty-selected nursing theorist, Dr. Betty Newman, who developed the theory of health as an expanding consciousness. The conceptual framework of this theory addresses family dynamics and community interactions as well as the holism of a person's experience and being in relationship to disease.

Simply put, the program emphasizes wellness and holistic medicine resulting in positive patient outcomes. ■

she said. She remembers one instructor that was especially helpful to her. "Dr. Marie Furtado made science fun," she said without a moment's hesitation.

Christie has continued to work hard at her career. "My husband and two daughters have had to learn to adjust to my various work schedules. I've worked all three nursing shifts, 12-hour days, 12-hour nights, and every weekend."

Christie relies on the Career Services Department at SBC, St. Peters as her support team. They help her find qualified employee candidates to fulfill one of her responsibilities as director of nursing for the busy care facility. ■
